



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## Why do we talk about housing justice?

Children tend to be hyper-aware of the injustice they recognize when they see an unsheltered person in their community. When we as caregivers acknowledge that some people do not have access to safe, clean, secure homes, it gives us an

opportunity to talk about justice and equity issues in our community. We can talk to children about the many reasons someone may not be able to live in a home and that communities have a responsibility to look for ways to make it fair and equitable.
